

#### WHATIS BEING SAMPLED AND WHY?

Phytoplankton tows are analyzed in the CROM Biology Lab; species of particular interest are Pseudo-nitzschia and Alexandrium. These phytoplankton can produce domoic acid and saxitoxin, which have the potential to cause Amnesic Shellfish Poisoning (ASP) and Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning (PSP), respectively.

Blue mussel samples are also sent in and are tested for both domoic acid and saxitoxin to inform subsistence shellfish harvests.

Ocean acidification water samples are sent to the CROM Chemistry Lab where they are processed to better understand the composition of our region's sea water, including looking at measurements such as pH.

#### FUTURE OUTLOOK

The CROM team is gearing up to beginsendingquarterlyreports to participating communities. The data collected from this program are specific to each community and paint a bigger picture about ecological health throughout our region.



# SEEDING THE FUTURE - APMI'S QUEST FOR THE PERFECT KELP

Exciting things are happening at APMI! A new wave tank is under construction, designed to test a variety of kelp seeding methods at different depths. This cutting-edge tool will help us better understand the dynamics of kelp growth and advance the success of sustainable kelp farming.

Meanwhile, our team is gearing up for an outplant experiment in Kachemak Bay, where we'll be testing several kelp seeding techniques with the local sugar kelp species. This project is a collaborative effort with the NOAA Kachemak Bay Lab and the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Massachusetts, bringing together local expertise and global science. By the end of October, APMI researchers will be comparing traditional kelp spore seeding methods with the innovative kelp gametophyte seeding approach. The latter may offer more growth control and efficiency, potentially boosting yield while using less space.

> We are also teaming up with the Kachemak Bay Kelp Hub on a kelp cosmetic project, exploring how locally grown kelp can be used in products like lotions and creams. This initiative is not only about innovation but also about creating new income opportunities for our coastal communities and inspiring greater interest in kelp farming across the region.

The ocean is full of possibilities, and at APMI, we're diving in!

"When people are excited about the work, that energy is infectious. I love helping organize Alliance meetings, trainings, and sharing updates in our newsletter. I also enjoy working across departments because we all share common goals."

#### ENGLISH BAY LAKES CLEANUP EFFORTS MOVE FORWARD

Our Tribal Fish & Wildlife Fisheries Program has been busy this fall! Fisheries Biologist Madeline Lee has been working closely with the Nanwalek community to clean up English Bay Lakes and remove derelict hatchery net pens. Decades-old debris, including a wooden net pen, sunken skiff, floats, pipes, and metal, was removed through the coordinated efforts of Nanwalek, CRRC, and partners. Over 30 metal walkway pieces, each weighing around 1,200 lbs, were airlifted from the lake system with support from Maritime Helicopters LLC, Pursuit Maritime LLC, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Nanwalek IRA Council.

We're thrilled these materials are being repurposed for community projects such as reinforcing 4-wheeler trails, building a lagoon dock, and creating a culvert for fish passage. Teamwork makes the dream work. Quyana to the Nanwalek community, our partners at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and all who supported this cleanup effort.

### KIDS CORNER MT. ECCLES CULTURE WEEK



We were thrilled to be able to attend the 2025 Mt. Eccles School Culture Week in Cordova. This educational event is organized annually by the Native Village of Eyak with support from the school. This year our Education and Outreach Specialist and Climate Change Coordinator brought three activities for cultural programming. One activity focused on how animals and people adapt to the often cold and often wet environment of Prince William Sound by testing how blubber, down feathers, and human skin adapt to cold water. The second lesson built on the idea of adapting to the world around us using natural resources by asking students to match animals to the Traditional clothing, handicrafts, and items they were used to make. The third lesson focused on mariculture and ocean monitoring, ending with a trivia game for the students.

Mt. Eccles Culture Week brings Traditional knowledge, handicrafts, and foods into the classroom. We are grateful to participate in this meaningful and fun event!

# ELDER SPOTLIGHT WITH DIANE SELANOFF TEACHING AT CRRC'S STAFF RETREAT

At CRRC's annual staff retreat in September, Elder and Community Catalyst, Diane Selanoff of Valdez led team members in sewing salmon leather and fur keychains. Diane often teaches classes on fur sewing in her community to a wide range of audiences. When asked what teaching means to her, Diane said, "We are always learning, always absorbing information. That's why teaching is important; teaching and learning can be directed."

During the handicraft session, Diane also spoke on Chugach region history, language, and told stories of the region. Diane has also recently become CRRC's Community Catalysts for Valdez, a role with our Alaska Southcoast Partnership, which supports community-driven priority projects in our region.

Our Education & Outreach team works across the region to create meaningful learning opportunities for students as well as community members of all ages. We are grateful to work with our Tribes and regional partners to implement place-based and culturally responsive education.

Early this fall, our Education and Outreach team attended Chugachmiut's Educator Summit. Facilitated by the Alaska Humanities Forum and Chugachmiut educators, this two-day workshop provided participants with an opportunity to discuss pathways towards educational goals for the Chugach region. This summit was informed by the previous gathering of the Tribal Education Committee (TEC), a working group of Tribal leaders from our seven communities brought together to identify goals related to what education, language, and culture can look like for future generations. The TEC's initial discussions brought forth topics such as re-awakening culture and language, support for adult learners, reclaiming schools as spaces that represent Chugach communities, and building partnerships. The Educator Summit utilized these goals as anchors to create meaningful workshop time for local regional educators. Sessions focused on further prioritizing language and culture into schools, teacher prep, student needs, advocacy, and educational sovereignty.

We are grateful for the guidance and vision of the Tribal Education Committee. Our deepest thanks to Chugachmiut for facilitating and organizing this event and to the Alaska Humanities Forum for running the workshop. Finally, thank you to the Alaska Native Heritage Center for hosting us. Quyana.
